Tombigbee Waltz

Traditional

This is a 2-part arrangement of the traditional fiddle tune, "*Tombigbee Waltz*". It is named for a river that flows from northeast Mississippi into the Alabama River. The word "*tombigbee*" was traditionally said to mean "*coffin maker*" in a Native American language. A version of this waltz was published as a song in 1909, although the song is much older, and may also have had minstrel origins.

The great American composer Aaron Copland incorporated this melody in his orchestral work "Appalachian Spring", which was based on the weaving together of a number of traditional musical strands seamlessly, including "Simple Gifts", "Dinah", "June Apple", "Old Paint", "Midnight on the Water", "Grey Eagle", and "Miss McLeod's Reel", along with "Tombigbee Waltz".

The two parts I arranged for this tune are a melody and a harmony. So find yourself a partner and enjoy!
